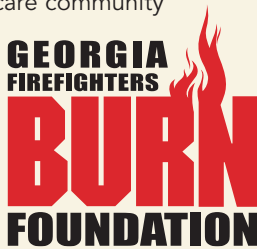

GFBF SPOTLIGHT:

Venessa Walker

Her face and voice likely are familiar traits to those connected in some way to the Georgia Firefighters Burn Foundation. Venessa Walker has been with GFBF for 19 years, more than half of the organization's history.

Today the executive administrator for GFBF, Walker has held positions of receptionist, administrative assistant and office manager. She started as an intern while attending the former DeKalb Technical Institute, and later accepted a full-time position with GFBF.

Along with her administrative responsibilities, Walker oversees GFBF's Give Burns the Boot® campaign. "We're excited about our 25th year of Give Burns The Boot," says Walker. "It's exciting to have a department call and brag about their drive and how much they raised for GFBF, or to take a call from a department that wants to get involved with boot drive for the first time. Having watched the different phases of boot drive 19 of its 25 years, I think one of the biggest

phases is the boot drive website at www.giveburnstheboot.com, where individuals and groups can make an online donation toward their local fire department's boot drive efforts or raise money themselves for that department."

Walker points to a drop in fire fatalities and injuries over the years through GFBF's partnership with fire service professionals. But she says the organization has much more work ahead. "Our work is far from over," she continues. "We're working hard to ensure that you never know the devastation of fire, but if you unfortunately do find out, we're here for you through the programs and services that we have the privilege to offer."

GFBF SPOTLIGHT:

John T. Robinson

Today, the kids John T. Robinson crossed paths with his first time at the Georgia Firefighters Burn Foundation's Camp Oo-U-La® summer camp are all grown up, some with children of their own.

"Hard to believe that was 21 years ago," says Robinson, adding that many of those children have embarked on their own career paths and are managing their personal lives. Robinson's direction, in particular with GFBF, has evolved as well. For 19 years, he served as a counselor during camp; two years ago, he took on a role of coordinator (one of three) for the Leaders in Training program—for 18 to 20 year olds. L.I.T. provides assistance to past campers and young staff members who are making the transition from camper to counselor. "We're not only teaching lessons to be used in the camp settings, we're teaching life lessons that you can use the other 51 weeks of the year," says Robinson.

A battalion chief for the Valdosta Fire Department, Robinson also serves on GFBF's board of directors—a position to which he was appointed in 2011. He is a 31-year veteran of the fire service, having begun his career in 1983 with the Quitman Fire Department. In 1990, he moved to the Valdosta Fire Department. He has held positions of firefighter, driver, company officer and captain. Robinson also is a member of the city's 911 Advisory

Board for the local 911 center that dispatches all emergency services within Lowndes County and the City of Valdosta.

For eight years, he has served as boot drive coordinator for the Valdosta Fire Department, which has participated in the drive, Robinson says, for at least 22 years.

"The men and women of the Valdosta Fire Department really stepped up this year and got excited about our campaign and the mission of GFBF as a whole," adds Robinson. "We have gone from just two collection sites to six collection sites this year." The department, he says, also is involved with GFBF's Project R.E.A.C.H. (Recycling Every Aluminum Can Helps), a year-round aluminum can recycling program.

He's grateful for the partnerships with fire departments around the state, what he describes as "the greatest and most caring firefighters in the world. Without their continued support and hard work, the Georgia Firefighters Burn Foundation could not and would not exist."

He began his public safety career in September 1998 with the City of Rockmart Fire and Emergency Services, making the rank of sergeant within the first year. He serves as logistics coordinator for GFBF's summer camp, is a member of Toastmasters International and is married with three children.



The time that **Daniel "Danny" Rumney** has spent volunteering with GFBF has lasted nearly as long as his lengthy career in fire service. Rumney has volunteered with the organization for more than 20 years. He spent 27 years as a firefighter and emergency medical technician with the Macon-Bibb County Fire Department. The Macon

native now lives in Juliette (the location for filming of the movie "Fried Green Tomatoes"). He has been married to his wife for 42 years; they have two daughters and one son as well as three grandchildren.

As deputy chief of Preparedness for Cobb County Fire & Emergency Services, **William L. Tanks Jr.** has oversight for education, training and facilities, and support services, among other roles, to a department of 29 stations (total of around 650 personnel) that protect more than 700,000 residents and visitors.



Before becoming deputy chief of Preparedness in June 2013, Tanks held positions to include division chief of training,

battalion captain and firefighter/EMT/paramedic.

Dayna Scott Vidal, RN-MSN, is the trauma program manager for Atlanta Medical Center, a Level 1 trauma center—one of only two in Atlanta.



Vidal spent five years as a critical care nurse and the program manager for the Burn Center at Grady Memorial Hospital in Atlanta. In addition to being a nurse manager, Vidal teaches trauma/burn education to nursing students throughout the state and volunteers with the Cascade Youth Organization. The Atlanta native and former marketing and advertising executive is married with two children.

Josh Kemerling

Still basking in the success of its Give Burns the Boot® efforts for 2013, the Winder Fire Department is excited about this year's drive. For 2013, the department placed first for most money raised in the highest per capita category. This year, too, appears to be a strong one, according to boot drive coordinator Josh Kemerling. "Earlier this year we hosted our annual boot drive and fortunately we had three great days!" says Kemerling, a part-time firefighter. "We were number one in the state last year for most monies raised per capita, and that was a great honor. Our department worked very hard to raise money and the efforts paid off greatly!"

Kemerling started with the department part time in 2000 before moving to full time a year later. In April 2014, he returned to part-time hours. In addition to GFBF boot drive coordinator on behalf of the department, he has served on the department's Special Services Committee

and Grant Writing Committee.

He's committed to helping spread the word about the various services GFBF provides — from continuing education to grants as well as support for firefighters and their families.

"I am very passionate about the Georgia Firefighters Burn Foundation because it is an organization that directly works not only in the continuing education part of our career field but also in helping our burn victims recover. The most rewarding part of my job is to know I am helping people typically when they need it the most."

both palms when she fell into a gas heater at nine months old. The family travels to Cincinnati with her roughly every 12 weeks for laser correction surgery, as grafts from her stomach and right leg were used to cover her

hands. "We all deal with the same things. We know what the others are going through. It's nice to have that."

GFBF hosts Burn Survivors Family Weekend at no cost for children, siblings, parents, caregivers and other adults. Families take part in a number of activities including arts and crafts,

fishing, movie nights and boating. Families also have an opportunity to attend support groups for both children and adults. This allows each family to share personal victories and struggles as burn survivors, as a way to help one another on the road to recovery.
